



Update from President of CCU January, 2009

Dear Friends of Christian Unity,

This past week I sent an email to members of my Board of Directors to share some reflections about the work of the Council on Christian Unity this past year, and to begin to anticipate the year ahead. In that report I highlighted several major “successes” in the life of the CCU that I feel we ought to celebrate and build upon as we look to the future.

I want to share four of these “successes” today for your information and for follow-up in relation to your congregational programming and involvement:

First, the Council on Christian Unity gave leadership to a significant church-wide Consultation on “**Becoming a Multicultural and Inclusive Church**” last March 27-29. I anticipate that follow-up to this Consultation will be a major item on the agenda of the CCU and our whole church for several years to come.

Second, there has been deepening of encounter within the **Stone-Campbell family** of churches. We are putting a special emphasis on the “**Great Communion Celebration**” this coming October 4, 2009, to honor and highlight the 200th anniversary of the publication of the *Declaration and Address*, one of the common founding documents of our movement.

Third, we have continued to make advances in the area of **interfaith dialogue and encounter**. A new “**Interfaith Toolkit**” has been developed in partnership with the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the United Church of Christ that provides “easy to use” resources to engage in local interfaith encounter and study.
